## TODAY'S THEME: ENDINGS

#### **IDIOM OF THE WEEK:**

#### dead end -

end in a way that prevents any possibility of further progress or advancement.

## RIDDLE OF THE WEEK?

What begins but does not end, ends all things that begin, but begins nothing?

### WORD OF THE WEEK:

resolution (noun), to resolve (verb), resolved (adjective)

#### **Definition:**

The act of resolving or determining upon an action, course of action, method, procedure, etc.

#### Synonym:

settlement, conclusion, solution, ending, closure

#### **Exercise:**

- Create a sentence with the word of the week
- Think of an antonym and try to also put it in a sentence

- 2. Act out an ending, each group deciding on one the following situations:
  - a dramatic ending
  - a sad ending
  - a happy ending
  - an unsatisfying ending (where the problem is not resolved)



#### **PROBLEM OF THE WEEK:**

# HOW TO END A STORY?

#### **ACTIVITIES:**

- 1. Group leader reads out the ending of a book the pupils know the plot and the conflict of
- 2. Pupils discuss how the build up of tension is resolved, how the conflict is solved, considering:
  - How different story lines and side plots come together to form a logical conclusion
  - How characters' development is completed (how they respond to the solution, or the effects their actions have on the ending)
  - The effects of language (how the mood changes depending of the language that is used; i.e. a sense of *finality*, *resolution*, *hope*, etc. is established to convey a message)
  - The effect of the last sentence
  - The **emotional response of the reader** to the ending (how do the pupils *feel* after the ending is read out?) and what the author's intention with this ending might have been (i.e. was there a *particular message* that this ending conveyed?)
- 3. In pairs, pupils read the endings of their own books and share how a particular ending is created and discuss what different types of endings they have just read (i.e. cliff hanger, happy/uplifting/hopeful ending, sad/dramatic ending, unresolved ending, etc.)

#### **CREATIVE WRITING:**

- Get into groups of 3
- Decide on a story or book you all know, where you know the conflict and how it is resolved
- Rewrite the ending to resolve the conflict in an alternative way (for example turn a sad ending into an uplifting and hopeful one)
- Take into account the development of characters, the effects of their actions, and the use of language
- Then share your new ending with the rest of the group and discuss how you have achieved these new effects.

#### FINAL WEEKLY CHALLENGE:

Using everything you have learnt in the four-week series, write a story where the main character confronts one of the following issues:

- conflict within a friend group
- conflict within a family
- conflict within a society
- conflict about about a natural disaster

#### Take into account:

- How to begin your story in an engaging way
- How to create a realistic character that goes
   through a development when facing the conflicts
   of your story.
- How to make build up and resolve suspense
- How solve the conflict and conclude your story in an impactful way that conveys a message
